# **Corn stars**

The backyard game with the filthy name takes Chicago by storm

Since the demise of Jarts, the spectacularly dangerous lawn darts that were eventually made illegal in 1988, there haven't been many backyard activities that have captured the public's heart. But there's a new game in town—one way less dangerous than heaving airborne spears toward a ring. Call it what you will—Cornhole, the Bags, the Sacks—over the past couple of years Chicago has embraced the gentle art of lobbing beanbags into a box with surprising fervor.

You've probably seen it on sidewalks, in alleys or at parking lots surrounding Soldier Field Dave Abell and Mark Smyth, both 29, grew up playing the game in Cincinnati—ground zero for Cornhole. It's so popular there, the city is home to the American Cornhole Association. When Abell and Smyth moved to Chicago a few years ago, they saw an opportunity to spread the fun by creating year-round, coed Cornhole leagues here.

"Growing up in Cincy, we knew this would be a good opportunity for Chicago," says Smyth, president of Backyard Players, the business through which they run the leagues. "There are a lot of groups that cater to people looking

or U.S. Cellular Field: a couple of wooden boxes spaced far apart and a group of people standing around at each end, sipping beers and tossing beanbags. If Cornhole sounds like the kind of thing not to be mentioned in mixed company, get your mind out of the gutter. The name derives from the game's Midwest roots: Instead of beanbags, early players tossed small sacks filled with corn and tried to sink them in a (yep) hole.

to play traditional sports: basketball, tennis, football. There's really nothing out there now catering towards the backyard-style games. We sought to fill that void."

Their leagues take place Monday nights at Cubby Bear and Wednesday nights at Joe's

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on Weed. Just \$85 buys a twoperson team six weeks of regular play and a guaranteed slot in the finals. For two years running, the leagues have sold out, with 40 teams registering at each bar.

While not directly affiliated with the American Cornhole Association, Abell and Smyth say they pretty much stick to that organization's rules. They have taken some liberties with the scoring system, though, and created their own lingo by playing off of Cornhole's cheeky name (all puns intended). Their scoring system includes a "taint" (any bag that lands between the front of the board and the hole) and a "cow pie" (a bag on the board).

Points are accumulated depending on where the bags fall: three for a bag in the hole (a "cornhole") and one for landing a bag on the board. At the end of a round (one member from each team makes four tosses), points cancel out. In other words, if one team racks up three points and its opponents manage just one, the first team finishes the round with a net score of two. The team that reaches 21 points first wins.

Most league members are in their twenties, with almost as many women playing as men. Part of what makes the game so popular, Abell and Smyth say, is the social aspect. The boxes are spaced 16 feet apart, with two players at each box. Since players stand next to their opponents while tossing—not their partners—they tend to strike up conversations with new people.

Steve Greanias, a 27-year-old who has played what he calls "the Bags" since high school, agrees. "After the game, win or lose, you have a beer with the other team that you're playing. It's an unintimidating way to meet these people. If you're looking to meet girls, you're forced to talk."

So in a day when people will gladly shell out \$700 for the latest Xbox 360 and spend hours in front of it, why is such a simple game so popular? "It appeals to everyone," Smyth says. "They're going to go to a bar anyway, so why don't you put a beanbag in their hand and have them toss, and have fun and have a little competition?"
